Governors at Springhill – What Do They Do?

Governors are unpaid volunteers who work to ensure high standards of achievement for all at Springhill by:

- Working with the school and the Bishop to set the school's vision, ethos and strategic direction;
- Holding the head teacher to account for the educational performance of Springhill and its pupils; and
- Overseeing school finances and making sure its money is well spent.

Springhill governors are expected to:

- 1. Contribute at governing body meetings, which consider:
 - The vision and ethos of the school;
 - Clear and ambitious strategic priorities and targets for the school;
 - The need to give all children, including those with special educational needs, access to a broad and balanced curriculum;
 - The school's budget, including how the Pupil Premium is spent;
 - The school's staffing structure.
- 2. Hold the senior leaders to account by monitoring Springhill's performance:
 - Evaluating all aspects of school performance;
 - Asking challenging questions of school leaders;
 - Considering the results of audits;
 - Ensuring the school follows the required policies and procedures;
 - Acting as a link governor on specific subjects;
 - Listening to and reporting to the pupils, staff, parents and wider community.
- 3. Ensure Springhill has the resources and support it needs (including business support, external advice, staff development and suitable premises) and monitoring the impact of those resources.
- 4. Serve on panels to:
 - Appoint and appraise the head teacher;
 - Agree pay recommendations;
 - Hear appeals about pupil exclusions;
 - Hear the second stage of staff grievances and disciplinary matters.

Governors do NOT:

- Write school policies;
- Undertake audits (even if the governor has relevant professional experience);
- Spend much time with pupils;
- Fundraise (this is the role of the Parents' Association);
- Observe in the classroom to judge the quality of teaching.
